Key Locational / Place Knowledge Human and Physical Geography

The weather around the world is not all the same. It changes depending on where you live in the world and the season.

In the United Kingdom we have 4 seasons—autumn, winter, spring and summer. (Also science)

In spring leaves start growing on trees and some plants start to grow (Also science)

The weather is warmer and sunnier in the summer. (Also science)

In autumn the leaves fall off trees. (Also science) It is cold in winter and sometimes it snows. (Also science)

The Winter months are December, January and February.

The Spring months are March, April and May. The Summer months are June, July and August. The Autumn months are September, October and November.

The **Equator** is an imaginary line around the middle of the earth. Countries near the equator are very hot, countries far away, for example the North Pole at the top and the South Pole at the bottom of the earth are very cold.

Life can be very different in hot and cold places. Hot and cold places can look very different and have different physical features. Different things will grow. animals and people will do different activities depending on the weather.

Geographical Enquiry (teacher led enquiries)

Ask questions about the weather.

Communicate in different ways e.g. pictures/ pictograms simple maps/sketches/labelled diagrams.







Key Locational / Place Knowledge

There are seven continents on Earth: Asia, Europe, Africa, North America, South America, Australia and Antarctica.

Bishops Stortford is in the continent of Europe.

Uganda is a country in the continent of Africa.

In Uganda there is a town called Namutumba.

In this town there is a school called Namutumba Primary School.

Namutumba has fewer people living there (2014 population = 18,736) than Bishops Stortford (2017 population = 40,089).

Human and Physical Geography

Key human features in Namutumba: Namutumba Primary school, (many other primary schools) Namutumba Hospital, The Iganga-Mbale Road (a large highway) goes through the centre of the town, many other roads, population 19 000,

<u>Key human features in Bishop's Stortford:</u> many schools, Herts and Essex hospital, many roads.

<u>Key physical features in Namutumba</u>: there are different seasons from us—wet and dry. At times it is hot and cloudy, other times it is warm and wet.

Therefore, different animals live in Uganda than England eg gorilla, chimpanzee, lion and elephant.

Key physical features in Bishops' Stortford: summers are warm/hot with a mixture of sun and clouds, winters are cold and wet.

Fieldwork skills

Listen to a teacher asking a teacher from Namutumba school questions about the local area. $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$

Audio/visual

Recognise a photo or video recording from the local area as a record of what they have seen.

Using maps and scale

Use picture maps and globes to locate the continents, England, Uganda, (Bishops Stortford and Namutumba.)
Use relative vocabulary (e.g. bigger/smaller, like/dislike) to describe these places.

Look at an aerial map of the school and try to create one eg as a class by using different sized blocks.

Compare to an aerial map of Namutumba school.
